Re: Comments received on No Left Turns, 23rd Street

Public Works implemented a pilot project for no left turns on 23rd Street, generally east of Louisiana and west of Haskell. The department solicited comments and feedback for over five months. The web site included a form for comment submittal that was featured on both the main Public Works page and the main City page. The Lawrence Journal World also included several references to the web site comment form and provided the general phone number for the department for citizens to call in their comments. This report summarizes and includes the feedback received.

As of today, we have received 128 comments regarding the No Left Turn pilot project on 23rd Street. Of the 128 comments received, 108 were in favor of the no left turn project, 11 were against, and 9 respondents were recorded as neutral (neither for or against, but submitting some other comment). Several other themes were recurrent in the comments submitted, as summarized below.

01/18/05	Dr. Bud Jacobs	I live on Vermont Street (2232) and hope that you will reconsider the "No Left Turn" restrictions off 23rd Street. There is so much traffic congestion on 23rd as it is, I can't imagine how these restrictions can ease the problem, in any way. I am hopeful that after a few weeks/months of these restrictions, the Traffic Safety Commission, or Public Works, will see the error of their ways, and eliminate the No Left Turn restrictions. Thank you for your consideration of this suggestion.
01/19/05	Scott Nissen	Glad to hear about the no left turn signs going in fro 23rd. W need to find ways to deal with the traffic problem and a single car making a left turn on 23rd in that area can cause a major problem. Glad you are giving this a try and am sure it will prove to be helpful for the vast majority of people concerned.
01/21/05	Jason Gordon	Hello. This is my neighborhood. I sue the intersection of Vermont and 23rd on a daily basis, to get to and from work. Furthermore, I work as a road rep for my employer and go through this area on a daily basis to reach my locations in and around the Oread neighborhood. Left turns generally suck for traffic, yes, I agree, but are you really going to cut off access to our neighborhood from the main street we use to get to and from work?! Turning left is a reality we all have to deal with in driving situations, people. Also, have you considered what this will do to traffic at the intersections of Mass and Haskell (not to mention even more back-up at intersections like 19th and Louisiana)?I would think that this will cause extremely backed-up traffic at all major intersections in this area. In the end it will actually slow down traffic on 23rd by clogging the major intersections and it will cause more traffic through this entire residential area. What's your solution over the long haul? I'm just curious: how many people who voted on this decision live in my neighborhood?
01/21/05	Anonymous	My husband and I have thought for a long time that the affected section of 23rd street should limit left turns. I think the new signs make the road safer and the traffic flow much more efficient. Lawrence is so crowded, and is difficult to drive through. I think this is a great step toward better traffic conditions.
01/21/05	Anonymous	This does not seem to be helpful. The congestion of people waiting to turn left at Massachusetts (because no one could turn earlier) is TERRIBLE. Most left turns (at Tennessee, Vermont, etc.) are made when the Mass. Light has traffic stopped coming from the other direction. If cars have to wait too long, the do go ahead and turn elsewhere. It makes more sense to continue to have those options.
01/23/05	John Lewis	I think the no left turn idea is long overdue do needs to be made permanent. I am not sure just the signs will do though, as most people probably will not even see them and if they do will ignore them. Some type of barrier would be more effective.
01/23/05	Paul Verhage	I like the restrictions from 4:00pm - 6:00 pm of No Left Turn but I would like to see it go from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm because the Kansas City workers are just getting into Lawrence at 6:00 pm. On the streets of Ohio, Tennessee, Vermont, new Hampshire, Rhode Island and Learner Avenue. I travel this quite frequently and at 6:00 pm it ties up traffic when people are trying to turn left on those streets.
01/23/05	Ron Kanterman	I think it is time to consider that the quality of life in Lawrence is more important than the traffic on 23rd street. Perhaps you should consider limiting the traffic on 23rd rather than diminishing the quality of life of those of us that live in the affected area. How would you like to back up every morning into 23rd street traffic to get out of your driveway. 23rd Street traffic is a problem. The volume of traffic needs to be managed. Expecting residents on Vermont to shoulder additional burden so that those who use 23rd will have a more efficient traffic flow is not reasonable. 01/23/05	Tracy Russell	I recently drove through the 23rd Street corridor prohibiting left turn lanes between 4 & 6. I do not believe the signage is adequate to warn motorists about the recent changes. I understand the signs are flagged, however, the posted times are too small for the traveling motorists to see before slowing to make their turn thus placing us back into the same situation we are trying to avoid-motorists slowing or stopping to turn. Also, I would like to see the signs posted before the intersection and not at the intersection to properly give the warnings in advance instead of when the motorist arrive a the intersection. In this scenario, the motorist can plan their route of travel more efficiently. They make a sign that says "No Left Turns at Intersection" according to the Manual on Uniform Traffic Devices. Has the City reviewed the possibility of placing the warning signs overhead the inside lane of traffic on a guide wire. This is in place along Dodge Street in Omaha, Nebraska as is very effective in providing adequate warnings to the motorists. Thank you for seeking the public's input. I am very happy this ordinance is now in effect.
01/25/05	Caroljean Brune	I think it is a marvelous idea long overdue. The congestion on 23rd should be alleviated and the safety of that road greatly improved by the no left turns.
01/25/05	Gayle Sigurdson	The time period should be extended to include 7-9 a.m. as well. The intersection at 23rd and Louisiana gets backed up and people take unsafe chances.
01/25/05	George Grieb	Bravo, Bravo!! Great Idea. I think we should do the same thing for a right hand turn (east) when traveling south on Iowa between Harvard and Bob Billings Parkway
01/25/05	Kenora R. Crowfeather	I think its a good idea, however I would have included morning traffic hours as well. P.S. There is a big pothole on the corner of 23rd and Mass where all eastbound cars in the right hand lane must go over, including all those who attend Haskell.
01/25/05	Matt Travis	I commend the effort to install the no left turns, however, the problem exists as well during the morning commute hours. I drive the 23rd street corridor daily to and from work and one of the biggest problems that I see both in the morning and in the afternoon is that people are trying to turn left from the side streets onto 23rd. This causes major problems because if a car in the right hand lane lets out side street traffic to cross, the person crossing cannot see traffic in the left hand lane, thus they get half way out and stop all traffic. I would suggest that the small streets with no traffic signals be forced to turn right only at all of the day, and not to allow any traffic from 23rd to turn onto those streets. This could be set up much like it is at 6th and Swartz without a signal. This problem will continue to increase as there is no immediate solution for the SLT. Thank you.

01/25/05	Wilma and Don Vaughn	Wilma and I are grateful for the new signs. I travel on 23rd after 5:00 pm often and the traffic is moving smoother now.

01/25/05	Anonymous	Thank you SO MUCH for putting up the no left turn signs! I've been commuting between Olathe and Lawrence for five years, and everyday I can't believe the idiots who hold up traffic trying to turn left at that time of day. Please make them permanent!

The traffic gets backed up for the entire block while people wait their turn to turn left onto 23rd. As a homeowner on the 2200 block of Tennessee, I often am unable to get into and out of my own driveway due to the traffic backup from 23rd and Tenn.

01/26/05	Susan Mangan	I really like the new no left turn signs. I have been complaining for years that there should be no left turns at those intersections during rush hour and I am so glad something is finally being done. There needs to be a police presence in that area, during those times, however, to enforce and/or educate the public depending on whether tickets will be given or just reminders. I drove past a very, very long line of cars waiting behind one that obviously couldn't read (or didn't care) at 5:30 pm today (Tuesday). Traffic was backed up from almost Massachusetts St. to Louisiana because of one inconsiderate driver ignoring the signs. Without some concerted effort to enforce the new signs I think many people will probably choose to just ignore them and continue to wreak havoc on rush hour traffic on 23rd St.
01/26/05	Anonymous	: The text size on the signs indicating the time frame for the prohibited turns is too small to read at 35-45 mph.

I do have one question related at Kentucky street - it appears that left (south) turns are allowed, as there is no signage I this correct? thanks very much!

This will surely cut down on accidents and drive time alike for all traveling west-east through our beautiful city as I for one have been involved in many close calls involving rear-end collisions through that stretch of infamous rush hour road. I am for banning left hand turns due to safety and congestion on already badly congested roadway.

01/31/05	Janet Horner	I drive from Lawrence Ave & Clinton Pkwy to East Hills Industrial Park everyday. The no left-turn policy in the afternoons is good and has helped my commute home. HOWEVER, there needs to be the same policy in effect in the mornings. Too many times I am backed up for several blocks waiting from someone to make a left-hand turn to Tennessee, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, or Learnard. There should also be some sort of patrolling of the restricted turn areas to ensure they are enforced. The first week or so there were MULTIPLE people still attempting left turns at restricted intersections.
01/31/05	Larry F. McGlinn	Great idea. It should include left turns on to 23rd off non-signalized side streets and time set back to 3:00 pm.
01/31/05	Mark Jakubauskas	I love it. Great idea. I live at 22nd and New Hampshire, and am constantly traveling this section of 23rd between Louisiana and Barker. One driver trying to make a left turn north can bottleneck the whole street for ages. I think the No Left Turn project should become permanent!

01/31/05	Patti Butcher	So glad you finally did this! Can it be expanded to include the morning rush hour (7-9am)? I always thought this would also be a good solution for 6th St. between Maine and Mass. AND on Iowa between Harvard and 15th!! Please help the drivers of Lawrence.
01/31/05	Robin Smart	I think it should be from 7am - 7pm on weekdays. The traffic in this town is outrageous through out the whole day and I do not believe that only two hours a day during the evening rush hour only, will make a big difference.
01/31/05	Ronald Tippie	I understand the need to not have traffic stopping and literally turning the street into a two land road. This is a band aid solution. I am amazed that we do not do the obvious and simply make our streets with center turn lanes. Why was Wakarusa built without one? Why do we always have to hire a consultant to add them section by section? All major roads need them. 23rd and 6th Street need them the length of the city. It gets the stopped traffic out of the flow of traffic that needs to move. While we are at it, we should have right turn lanes on major streets as well, for ALL intersections. Accidents are caused not nearly so much by speed as by abrupt changes in the speed of traffic. We seem to have a city dedicated to slowing traffic down as opposed to increasing the orderly flow of it. That is a mistake, especially for the long term.
01/31/05	Tracy Russell	The prohibited hours should be from 0700 - 1900 hours Monday thru Friday. The posting of the signs has to be addressed. There are no pre-warning signs notifying the motorists of the upcoming prohibited left turns, thus, drivers can not plan their route of travel prior to reaching the intersection which causes confusion. When permanent signs are posted, I would like to see the signs posted above the inside lane of traffic so the signs are clearly visible to everyone. This is depicted along Dodge Street in Omaha, NE where similar ordinances are in effect.
01/31/05	William Smith	I think you should have both morning and evening rush hour times for the no left turns.
01/31/05	Anonymous	An excellent plan. However, left turn lanes/lights should be provided at reasonable distances.

02/01/05	Ryan H.Devlin	Hello. I have some thoughts for you to ponder about the 23rd St. "so-called" improvement plan. First of all, prohibiting people from turning onto those affected streets from 4pm-6pm (Mon-Fri. I believe) is as low as it goes. Now, there are alternatives & which ever one you decide, the better. We widen 23rd St & include in these affected areas left turn lanes, lanes that do NOT impede traffic flow (nor do they require traffic lights) though, from Sue Hack's perspective in her e-mail to me, even as good of an idea as this is, it's not a viable option due to houses & businesses), or we close those streets off from 23rd st traffic entirely. Either way, the traffic on 23rd st functions PROPERLY, without a bottleneck. I travel 23rd St everyday to work & the way it works right now, it is horrendous. The other option is that from 7am to 7 pm Mon-Fri, NOBODY is allowed to turn onto those affected streets from 23rd st. These are painful options & I am afraid that either way people are going to be upset, but tough. Regulations that are not properly enforced, need to be thrown out of the city's ordinances & we need to make Lawrence better & not more bitter for the residents or the visitors. Thank you.
02/02/05	Anonymous	Good idea. Twenty-third street is a mess between 4:00 and 6:00. The Learnard turn is particularly dangerous. If this works to increase traffic flow I am for it. Right now I avoid 23rd in the late afternoon as much as possible.
02/03/05	Terry Melton	I think it's an improvement. Now make it even better for me and include 7AM to 9AM to help my drive to work. Thank you.
02/03/05	Tina Addington	I don't live in Lawrence anymore, but I commute from Overland Park. I was thrilled to see the no left turn signs. They make that strip of 23rd street so much safer. I think it's wonderful!
02/04/05	Carol Jacobson	Thank you for this safety measure! I've seen cars backed up across Louisiana St. because someone is trying to turn left on Tenn, or Vermont. I live on Vermont St. Many cars headed E on 23rd, turn left on Vermont and race down Vermont thinking they can avoid what people in this town think of as a "traffic jam", sometimes no more than two cars in the left turn lane on Mass. The speeding down Vermont is unbelievable. One afternoon I was sitting on my porch reading. Across the st. from me, a little old boy who had just celebrated his 2nd bday, dropped a large iridescent purple ball which rolled into the st. (He had just learned to open his backyard gate.)He was wearing a little bright red suit. As he came near the curb to get his ball, though he was very visible, a car sped past, not slowing a bit. I ran to the st. as another car was coming. I waved to the driver and pointed to the little boy. The driver did not slow down, though I was now in the middle of the st. waving at her. Had she hit the little boy, she would have pleaded for mercy-for herself, though she showed none for the little boy, who was clearly visible in his bright red suit, as was that iridescent purple ball in the gutter. It seems in Lawrence, cars have the right-of-way. The disregard shown for human life is shocking. This project is hopefully the beginning of some common sense changes. Thank You!

Sts.; 23rd is so busy it is a barrier to pedestrians and bicyclists, in spite of crosswalks at Mass. and Louisiana. It doesn't feel safe to cross either intersection on foot or bike. A sidewalk running on the north side of the street all the way from 23rd and Louisiana west to Barker would help. Last night walking home, I had to walk in the grass/mulch on the north side of 23rd btwn. Vermont and Mass. just to cross the street at the light so I could double-back to Vermont to go home. In the short-term, it will help to encourage use of City bus system more, as well as car-pooling to work.
