Subject: Comment regarding traffic calming request on Kensington Rd

Mr. Cronin et al.,

I am writing to address item III.B - Traffic Calming, Kensington Rd. Between 25th Terrace & 27th Street on the agenda for the April 3, 2017 Transportation Commission meeting.

I do not feel that a traffic calming device is necessary for this section of Kensington Road. As the traffic data included with the agenda indicates, the speed is not 5 mph or greater than the speed limit and the number of vehicles using this portion of Kensington Road is very significantly below the maximum of 3,000 vehicles possible on a collector street.

I have lived on Kensington Road for more than 20 years and it is my perception that there is less traffic than in the past. In addition, cars are traversing the street at slower speeds. The slower speeds are likely due to the considerable increase in on-the-street parking (especially when they park more than a foot from the curb ②). The traffic volume has changed over time as more through streets have been completed, the most significant being the extension of E. 25th St. Terr. and, of course the completion of the Southwest Lawrence Trafficway.

As for children walking to and from school, there is a sidewalk in good repair that they are able to use. In addition, since the crossing guard is stationed at Mayfair, it's easier for the children who do not live on Kensington to walk down Mayfair to get to school.
